

# 25th Anniversary of the Panama Canal Museum

This year is the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Panama Canal Museum in 1998. To honor this event, we are happy to share excerpts of a brief history written by Joe Wood, President of PCMC Friends, entitled *How the Museum Got Started*: In the President's message in the September 1985 edition of the Canal Record, Adrian "Kibby" Bouche, was listed as chair of the Museum Committee, which was established for the purpose of exploring the feasibility of creating a museum to be operated under the auspices of the Society. This was the beginning of the Panama Canal Society's effort to create a museum to preserve Panama Canal and Canal Zone history. While there was some initial interest, the effort never got off the ground. In the June 1986 Canal Record, the President's message stated: "Bouche completed a very comprehensive investigation on the needs and requirements involved in the establishment of a Panama Canal Museum... concluding with the finding that, even with reducing the scope, it is an overwhelming project for a Society relying on volunteers, in addition to requiring a considerable outlay of funds. As a result, the Panama Canal Society's Panama Canal Museum project has been terminated."

In May 1997, Chuck Hummer called me and asked if I would like to help form a museum to preserve the history of the U.S. in Panama before the U.S. turned over the Canal. Chuck and Davis Stevenson had been concerned that the history of the U.S. presence in the Canal Zone and the institutional memory of the many people who had lived there and worked for the Panama Canal would be lost once the U.S. transferred the Canal. Chuck was an officer of the Society and wanted the support of the Society in the creation of the museum. Recognizing the past efforts of Kibby Bouche to enlist the support of the Society, Chuck asked me if I could prepare a comprehensive prospectus and feasibility study that would assess the viability of starting and successfully operating a museum and present a business plan and recommendation to the Society for their endorsement of a museum. Having been involved in numerous civic activities while working for the Panama Canal, and not really wanting to re-engage, I begged off. Chuck was very persuasive, however, making the case that no one else is going to preserve our history if we don't do it

ourselves. I spent the better part of 1997 and the early part of 1998 preparing the study and concluded that, while it would be a major undertaking to start and operate a museum, it appeared that there could be a strong underpinning of support from the more than 4,000 Society members and others who had an interest in preserving their unique history, and that membership could form the foundation for our endeavor.

Chuck presented the prospectus to the Society Board, with a favorable recommendation to move forward. The board felt that the museum should be established as a completely separate organization so as not to obligate the Society to an outlay of funds that could drain its reserves. At the same time, Betty LeDoux arranged with an attorney to draft a constitution and by-laws for the museum. On March 15, 1998, the museum organization, named the Panama Canal Society Foundation (although not connected in any way to the Society), was formally established and registered as a Florida Non-Profit Corporation. In July of that year, the first organizational meeting was held in Orlando in conjunction with the Reunion. A small group of about 25 people attended the meeting and all vowed to support the effort. Most in the audience immediately pledged donations (several of \$1,000 or more). The founding officers were: President, Joe Wood; Vice President, Betty LeDoux; Executive Vice President, Chuck Hummer; Treasurer, Nancy Van Siclen; Secretary, Marie Wright Gibson.

Our first formal meeting took place on September 25 and 26, 1998, over a weekend in Tampa, and allowed us to spend time organizing and mapping out our goals and objectives. On March 18, 1999, we received our formal approval from the IRS to operate as a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization, which allowed museum purchases to be tax-exempt and contributions to be tax deductible - an important milestone triggering increased contributions.
